COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Special attention is given to advanced areas of Spanish grammar appropriate for oral argumentation and expository writing and also to distinctions between formal and informal usage; continued development of conversational and written skills through discussing the different cultural aspects of Spanish-speaking countries, emphasizing the richness of the different cultures as well as dialectal uses of grammar; critical and creative writing with emphasis on summaries, narratives, and descriptions of a factual nature, and supported opinion. Authentic materials promote the understanding of Hispanic cultures.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS:

Students who complete one year of Spanish at Dixie State University (8 credits) fill the language requirement for the Associate of Arts Degree, and student who completes two years of Spanish can fill the language requirement for the Bachelor of Arts Degree.

PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Expected Learning Outcomes to be accomplished by the end of the Spanish program:

1. **Oral Proficiency:** Students will be able to communicate in the presentational, interpersonal and interpretive modes at the advanced low level according to ACTFL.
2. **Writing Competency:** Students will be able to express themselves in the presentational, interpersonal and interpretive written modes of communication at the Advanced Mid-level according to ACTFL.
3. **Culture Awareness:** Students will be able to analyze the relationship between the products, practices and perspectives of the Spanish culture.
4. **Literature analysis:** Students will be able to demonstrate analytic, interpretative and critical thinking skills with respect to texts from Latin America, and Spain.

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES:

The main objective of Spanish 3060 is to improve student's competence in writing narrations and critical essays as well as to reach a higher level of speaking ability. Spanish 3060 pays special

attention to the correct usage of grammatical structures as well as “ortografía” (spelling and punctuation), therefore students will be encouraged to *consciously* control grammar and spelling when writing and speaking in Spanish.

By the end of this course, successful students will:

- Show competence in writing narrations and critical essays in Spanish
- Use correct grammar structures, spelling and punctuation in Spanish
- Develop conversational and written skills through discussing the different cultural aspects of Spanish-speaking countries
- Show awareness of the richness of the different cultures as well as dialectal uses of grammar.

VERTICAL CREDIT:

Students passing this advanced class with a grade of C or better may receive vertical credits for Spanish 1010, 1020, 2010, and 2020 (16 credits), if credits for these classes have not already been received. These credits do not have a grade assigned. These credits cannot be awarded until the final grades have been calculated; therefore, the process for obtaining the credits will be explained prior to the end of the semester. There is a posting fee of about \$25 for these credits.

*** Students who have done their secondary education (High School) in a Spanish-speaking country are not eligible for vertical credit.**

GRADES:

Your final grade for this course will be determined on a percent of the total possible and in accordance with the following descriptions: No extra credit will be offered.

Compositions- Taller de escritura writing activities: You will submit these activities via Canvas as well as a hard copy to the instructor. We will discuss length and topics as they approach. They will be typed using Times New Roman 12 pt. font, name, class, date in the upper left-hand corner single-spaced on the first page only, with the title (center justified, same size font) and body being double-spaced, left-justified, with no extra spacing between paragraphs, and 1” margins.

Written Exams: You will be tested on the *Léxico*, *Estructuras*, and *Ortografía y puntuación* sections of the chapters. All three (3) exams (except the final) will be taken at the Testing Center via Proctorio on Canvas, you will be given several days to complete the lesson tests, no extensions available. Waiting until the last day and having “issues” does not warrant an extension. Be aware lines can be long and waiting for a spot happens regularly, so plan accordingly.

Oral Interviews: These will be one-on-one interviews about a given topic, length will be discussed as they approach.

Final Exam: Will be taken in class during the time and day scheduled by the university. No early tests given—the premature purchase of an airline ticket is not an acceptable excuse for missing the final.

Homework: You are responsible for preparing all assignments before coming to class on the designated day.

- Supersite activities (**graded homework**) on vhlcentral.com, NOT Canvas, consists of any assigned activities from the Supersite. Supersite activities are to be done concurrently in the section taught in order to consolidate your understanding so you are better prepared for the class discussion.

ALL LATE WORK WILL BE ASSESSED A 50% REDUCTION.

Participation and attendance: You will actively contribute to class and group discussions both by asking and by answering questions; it also means that you will willingly engage in class activities and that you will always use the language of the course, i.e., Spanish. All students are expected to attend every day and arrive on time. Absence from class will affect your grade, as will tardies, early departures, and regularly entering and leaving the room while class is in session, all of which are very disruptive. You are allowed to miss **two (2)** class periods without getting your final grade affected. Every absence beyond the three allowed will result in a 5% drop of your participation and attendance grade. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to learn the material, not mine to teach it to you on an individual basis. Having 16 absences is grounds for failure in the course.

COVID-19 Statement: Be flexible!
